

Understanding Cinema: How we interpret what we see on screen

We all have an inherent understanding of narrative that we may not be fully aware of; we often know who the "bad guy" in a film is before they even start speaking. This workshop will look at how movies use its audiences' familiarity with genre and narrative to help make the story more entertaining. We will begin by looking at the work of one of the very first professional film scholars who studied how films can manipulate audiences, with techniques such as "Artificial Landscape" and the technique named after the man himself, the "Kuleshov Effect."

We will then look at some contemporary examples of film scenes in isolation, and examine the different ways in which the filmmakers are influencing the audience. Lighting, sound design, framing, focus, and countless other aspects all help us build up an idea of what is happening in a scene and help us determine how we should feel about each character.

This event is aimed at anyone with either an interest in movies and storytelling, and/or those that would like to apply logical thinking to popular culture. There will be a number of short clips and movie scenes, but unfortunately popcorn will not be provided.
